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WHY WE EXIST



One in 22 babies have a major congenital anomaly, **most** are diagnosed in the prenatal period.

A major congenital anomaly is a difference in the health, development or genetics of the baby that may lead to a changed developmental path, pregnancy loss, stillbirth, early death or significant medical interventions in the postnatal period.

Prenatal diagnosis of a fetal anomaly is more frequent than people think.

Parents are left to grapple with new and complex health information and try and make sense of what this means for their baby, their family and their future.

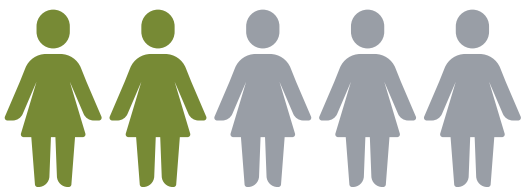


85% of mothers reported re-experiencing symptoms of trauma and 35% met full diagnostic criteria for Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

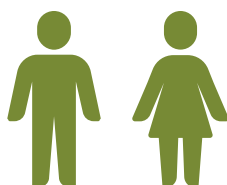

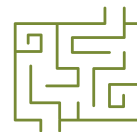

22-23 ACHIEVEMENTS

ADVOCACY

Our commitment to advocacy led to meetings with the Hon. Ged Kearney (Assistant Minister for Health and Aged Care) and representatives from the Population Health Division of the Department of Health and Aged Care, where we were encouraged to prepare a submission for the Senate Inquiry into Universal Access to Reproductive Healthcare. Unfortunately, our lengthy submission was not referenced by the Committee, and the unmet needs of parents who receive a prenatal diagnosis were overlooked in the inquiry's final report.

We are delighted to report that our next advocacy endeavour was more successful! Our detailed response during the community consultation period of the updated Mental Health Care in the Perinatal Period clinical guideline led to the inclusion of prenatal diagnosis. This is the first time the psychosocial aspects of prenatal diagnosis are visible in this national guideline. We thank the Expert Working Group and COPE for their response.

We strongly align with the social model of disability.

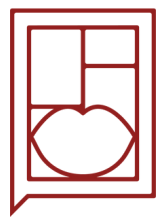

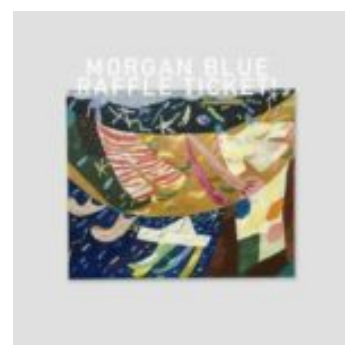

We received continued funding through the 3-year competitively awarded grant for **Facing the Unexpected: Improving women's mental health through training to address the psychosocial aspects of prenatal diagnosis**. This stage of funding allowed us to progress our training project, for the first national multidisciplinary psychosocial-focused training for professionals who work with parents who receive a prenatal diagnosis.

We continue to share our progress at national and professional events, building awareness and interest. As a result, our list of collaborators has grown. The first of the two research studies to inform the development of the training program was successfully completed and we look forward to sharing the results when published. Our second study, designed with people with lived experience, achieved ethics approval and moved to recruitment.

ART HELPS HEAPS

Art Helps Heaps aims to make creativity accessible to everybody through a sustainable and long term approach to collaboration, and in the process do good and raise awareness of genetic disorders and rare diseases. Art Helps Heaps generously donated 100% of the profits from their Project 2.

Donations from Art Helps Heaps and Morgan Blue were directed to the development of new information resources for parents who receive a prenatal diagnosis.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

It is an honour to provide my first report as Chairperson for *Through the Unexpected* (TTU), in our third year of operations as a Health Promotion Charity. This has been a strong and busy year for TTU, and we have maintained the strong momentum that has been ever present since inception. TTU has continued to develop and maintain robust relationships and partnerships with stakeholders across the sector and beyond. Our work this year has continued to grow the body of resources and information for expectant parents, both on our own website, but also through abstracts, presentations, media engagement and submissions to inquiries, committees and guidelines for practice.

There have been some changes to the board structure and membership over the 22-23 financial year, with Ali Deslandes moving from the Chairperson role into a Director position, after more than two years of continuous and strong leadership. One of our founding board members, Samantha Thomas, submitted her resignation following more than two years of generous service to the organisation. TTU is deeply grateful to Ali for her expert leadership as Chair, and to Samantha for the skills and knowledge she generously shared during her time on the board.

The TTU board continues to prioritise the expertise of people with lived experience, with several board members having lived experience of a prenatal diagnosis. Our board continues to maintain a diverse range of skills and expertise including medicine, obstetric sonography, nursing, mental health, social work, academia, legal, and financial. We are a passionate group of people with a commitment to work that is impactful and always striving for best practice.

A major component of TTU's activity this past year has been progressing the development of our high quality, multidisciplinary, co-designed training package, for professionals. This training package has been generously funded by the Liptember foundation. The first phase of this project is now complete, this was a research study into the perspectives of professionals working with people who receive news of a possible or confirmed foetal anomaly or variation. It brings a significant sense of pride to reflect on this achievement; our first major funded activity. Upon reflection, this pride is located in how our shared commitment to impactful, best practice work, is showing up in this project. Similarly, our dedication and commitment to honouring the expertise of people with lived experience, and finding ways to work safely, respectfully and meaningfully in this space, despite the significant diversity in the lived experience of receiving a prenatal diagnosis.

Once again, this year has shown that TTU is an organisation with solid foundations, dedicated membership, and shared principles. I look forward to seeing what the next year brings as we continue to establish our position as a leading organisation protecting the mental wellbeing and empowerment of people who receive a prenatal diagnosis.

Principal activities

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of financial statements are set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards- AASB 1060 *General Purpose Financial Statements – Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities*, issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB), and associated regulations and the *Corporations Act 2001*, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in the relevant accounting policies within note 1 and are based on the various factors, including expectations of future events management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances.

1.2 Statement of Compliance

The Company does not have 'public accountability' as defined by AASB 1053 *Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards* and is therefore eligible to apply Tier 2 reporting framework under the Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements comply with the recognition and measurement requirements of Australian Accounting Standards, the presentation requirements in those standards as modified by AASB 1060 *General Purpose Financial Statements – Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-For-Profit Tier 2 entities* and the disclosure requirements in AASB 1060. Accordingly, the financial statements comply with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures.

1.3 Information about the Company

Through the Unexpected is a charity registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission. The registered office and principal place of business is as follows:

1.4 Revenue

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the company is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Grant Revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income when the Company satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements or Grant Deeds. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the Company is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the Statement of Financial Position as a liability until these conditions are satisfied.

Income recognition from grants received by *Through the Unexpected* has been appropriately accounted for under AASB 1058 or AASB 15 based on the assessment performed.

Other Revenue

Other revenue (which includes donation and fundraising revenue) is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive the payment is established.

1.5 Income Tax

As *Through the Unexpected* is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax; no provision for income tax has been raised.

1.6 Current and non-current classifications

Assets and liabilities are presented in the Statement of Financial Position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions and other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Deposits with maturity dates greater than three months are considered investments.

On initial recognition investments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost in accordance with AASB 9 Financial Instruments.

1.8 Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are measured at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses in accordance with AASB 9 Financial Instruments. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

1.9 Property plant and equipment

Through the Unexpected holds no Plant and Equipment.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1.10 Intangible assets

Through the Unexpected holds no Intangible Assets.

1.11 Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

1.12 Employee benefits

Through the Unexpected has no employees.

1.13 Goods and Services Tax (GST) and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are consigned net of the amount of associated GST, unless GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST, recoverable from or payable to, the ATO is included in other receivables or other payables in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO are presented as operating cash flows.
